Why this candidate wishes to be a member of the House of Keys?

Because I was one of a generation that enjoyed a career that played out during a period of almost continuous growth and it is time to do everything possible to ensure that the legacy passed on to those who follow us is the best it can be. I think I can contribute.

How well does the candidate think that the present?
